MODULE: CURRENT EVENTS

LESSON OBJECTIVE

INTEGRATE INFORMATION FROM DIVERSE SOURCES, BOTH PRIMARY AND SECONDARY, INTO A COHERENT UNDERSTANDING OF AN IDEA OR EVENT.

The definition of "text" in the 21st century has evolved to include more than just the written word, and students learn through a variety of media. Building a coherent understanding of contemporary issues involves more than reading; it includes watching and listening, as well as interpreting and synthesizing.

Issues & Controversies embraces a diverse range of sources, including traditional text, video, and audio recordings. Students can integrate information from primary and secondary sources in all forms.

LESSON IDEA:

One of the most powerful ways to engage students is through choice. Issues & Controversies includes such a deep repository of information on each topic that students can choose how they want to engage with the information, whether through video, audio, visual, or written content.



LESSON OBJECTIVE

INTEGRATE INFORMATION FROM DIVERSE SOURCES, BOTH PRIMARY AND SECONDARY, INTO A COHERENT UNDERSTANDING OF AN IDEA OR EVENT.

Social studies curricula are expansive, spanning a wide range of issues and topics relevant to contemporary times. With so many topics, it's almost a guarantee students will find something that sparks their interests.

Issues & Controversies features more than 500 Pro/Con articles on hundreds of contemporary issues, providing students the ability to explore topics that are interesting or relevant to them. Students can explore Pro/Con articles in the news from the Issues & Controversies home page, use the search feature to look for specific topics of interest, or even browse through the hundreds of overview, QuickTake, and Intelligence Squared debate videos.

LESSON IDEA:

Empower students to explore the issues and controversies that interest them by implementing an Issue of the Month assignment. Each month, students can use Issues & Controversies to find a topic about which they want to learn more. They can use the Pro/Con articles, Intelligence Squared debate videos, QuickTake videos, primary sources, multimedia, infographics, editorials, and more to become an expert on their topic.

Extend the assignment by challenging students to present about their topic to their peers each month!

MODULE: CURRENT EVENTS

LESSON OBJECTIVE

DETERMINE THE CENTRAL IDEAS OR INFORMATION OF A PRIMARY OR SECONDARY SOURCE; PROVIDE AN ACCURATE SUMMARY OF HOW KEY EVENTS OR IDEAS DEVELOP OVER THE COURSE OF THE TEXT.

Many students struggle with determining the central idea and summarizing difficult texts. In social studies classes. students need to be able to do this with primary and secondary sources to develop an understanding of the concept or event.

Issues & Controversies can elevate struggling students by providing high-quality examples of summaries and a plethora of topics to explore. Pro/Con articles summarize controversial topics from both sides of the argument, and overview and QuickTake videos are short summaries of high-interest issues. Each topic is supported by primary and secondary sources.

LESSON IDEA:

Court cases are among the most difficult items to summarize. *Issues & Controversies* summarizes pivotal court cases by explaining each one's Background, Legal Issues, Decision, and Impact. This structure can provide the scaffold that struggling students need to practice summarizing.

Using the Issues & Controversies court case summaries as a model, have students replicate the form to summarize court cases relevant to the lesson or their interests.

LESSON OBJECTIVE

EVALUATE DIFFERING POINTS OF VIEW ON THE SAME EVENT OR ISSUE BY ASSESSING CLAIMS, REASONING, AND EVIDENCE.

Opinions and bias can cloud discourse on important issues and topics, making communication and coming to a consensus difficult, if not outright impossible in some cases. Evaluating differing points of view is an essential skill, not just for students but also for responsible citizens of the world.

Issues & Controversies includes hundreds of Intelligence Squared debate videos that feature scholars, journalists, and experts debating contemporary issues in a formal setting. These debates show students that people can share information and disagree with each other in a civil, respectful fashion.

LESSON IDEA:

A Socratic seminar is a method of discussion that enables students to share and defend their opinions while also learning from the opinions of their peers. By utilizing this method in social studies classrooms, students can deepen their understanding of an important issue or event, while sharpening their respectful discussion skills.


Use the Issues & Controversies' Pro/Con articles to assign a topic of discussion and prepare them for the Socratic seminar.
